Problem 1. Customers call the reservation desk at Fluttering Duck Airlines at a rate of 4 customers per hour. There is 1 agent working at the reservation desk at any given time, and each phone call takes an average of 20 minutes. The phone system can only handle 3 customers at a time ( 1 with an agent, 2 waiting) - any phone calls arriving when there are 3 customers are simply lost.

This setting can be modeled as a birth-death process with the following arrival and service rates:

\lambda_{i}=\left\{\begin{array}{ll}
4 & \text { if } i=0,1,2 \\
0 & \text { if } i=3,4, \ldots
\end{array} \quad \mu_{i}=3 \quad \text { for } i=1,2, \ldots\right.
$$

a. Over the long run, what is the probability that there are $n$ customers in the system? $(n=0,1,2,3)$
b. Suppose you find that the steady-state probabilities are:

\pi_{0}=0.15 \quad \pi_{1}=0.21 \quad \pi_{2}=0.27 \quad \pi_{3}=0.37 \quad \pi_{n}=0 \text { for } n=4,5, \ldots
$$

(This may or may not match what you found in part a.) Over the long run, what is the expected number of customers in the system?
c. Suppose you find that the long-run expected number of customers in the system is 1.86 . (This may or may not match what you found in part b.) Over the long run, what is the expected waiting time? Use the steady state probabilities given above in part b.
